## On the Subject of Dues

While a literary organization drawing members from all walks of life, every age group, every strata of society, and with varied interests, we are a slightly irreverent group. Not all are scholars of Sherlock Holmes, but all are Holmes and Watson fans.

It is simple to join: Complete an application (name, address, phone #, email address) and pay your dues. There are no admittance requirements, no test of one's knowledge, no limit on members, no other restrictions. Currently, with 110 individual memberships plus 19 family memberships, our membership totals 123 households and nearly 130 people.

Above all, **The Sound of the Baskervilles** is an inclusive group highly invested in the well-being and safety of all Sherlockians.

\$25 each year for an individual, or \$35 each year for family membership (2 or more per household) brings our Members a copy of our monthly newsletter *Ineffable Twaddle* either by email or post, a bound copy of *Beaten's Christmas Annual* (our annual magazine-style publication for the Members by the Members), and invitation to all monthly meetings and special events.

Our fiscal year runs from April 1 through March 31. New members who join mid-year (defined as during October 1 to March 31) may pay reduced dues—as shown on our "Join" webpage—for the time remaining in the fiscal year.

## Breaking News...from SOBs Geoff & Cara!

*We hope that many of you had the opportunity to view the 90-second preview to the new TV show “Watson” ([Watson’ Trailer Sets Up Morris Chestnut-Led CBS Medical Drama](#)) or took the time after Sunday night’s (January 26) AFC Championship Game to watch the first full episode of this new medical mystery series on CBS.*

*We hope that those who did will share with us their critiques/reviews of actor Morris Chestnut’s adventure as Watson for all to read!*

*In the meantime...SOB’s Geoff Jeffery & Cara Cross have alerted us to the “2025 Preview” found in the Winter 2024/25 issue of “Sherlock Holmes Magazine,” which promises two new short-term (8-episodes each) shows in 2025!!*

*Following are excerpts of their comments:*

### “Sherlock & Daughter”—Network: The CW/Discovery+

“Hot on the heels of Netflix’s *Enola Holmes*, which introduced a younger sister for the detective, comes *Sherlock & Daughter*, which controversially links him up with a girl who believes she is his offspring.

Like *Watson*, it was showcased at Mipcom, but unlike the CBS offering, this new series has a period setting and was filmed in Ireland last spring.

David Thewlis, sixty-one, who recently took on the role of Fagin in *The Artful Dodger*, plays an aging, ‘grumpy’ Holmes, struggling to solve a case that is ‘risking friends’ lives.’ Twenty-nine-year old Blu Hunt plays his alleged daughter, Amelia.

‘After witnessing her mother’s mysterious murder, young Californian Amelia Rojas learns her missing father may be the legendary Sherlock Holmes,’ reads the blurb. ‘She journeys to London to find him, but he is not what she expected. Holmes is stymied. He is unwilling or unable to investigate a sinister case with roots that stretch from America to Australia.’

‘Amelia is determined to prove she has inherited Holmes’s powers of deduction. Holmes sees a chance to test her claim and use her as his proxy. He sets her a challenge: Sherlock’s daughter? Prove it. Crack this case.’

Penned by Brendan Foley, the series also stars Scotsman Dougray Scott as Moriarty; and Sean Duggan plays Dr. Watson in the final two episodes.”



### “Young Sherlock”—Network: Amazon Prime

“Expected to be the third Sherlockian TV series debuting in 2025, *Young Sherlock* promises to be the most lavish production of the year. Behind-the-scenes photos and footage from filming locations reveal a big-budget spectacle, with the Victorian Era meticulously and vividly brought to life.

The eight-episode series will be directed by Guy Ritchie, who previously directed two films about the famous detective starring Robert Downey, Jr. as Holmes, Jude Law as Dr. Watson, and Rachel McAdams as Irene Adler.

His new venture into the Holmesian universe is based on the [Young Sherlock Holmes](#) novels by Andy Lane. ‘In *Young Sherlock* we’re going to see an exhilarating new version of the detective everyone thinks they know in a way they’ve never imagined before,’ said Ritchie.

According to the official logline, ‘At age nineteen, Sherlock Holmes is disgraced, raw, unfiltered, unformed, when he finds himself caught up in a murder mystery at Oxford, which threatens his freedom. Diving into his first-ever case with a wild lack of discipline, Sherlock manages to unravel a globe-trotting conspiracy that will change his life forever.’

Twenty-six-year-old *Harry Potter* actor Hero Fiennes Tiffin has been cast in the title role, while his uncle in real life, Joseph Fiennes, plays his father, Silas Holmes, who is described as a ‘scientist, explorer and self-made businessman.’ ...

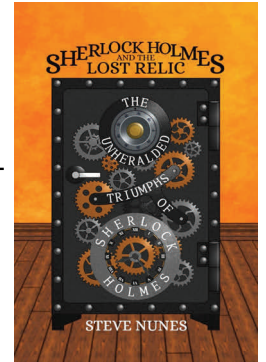

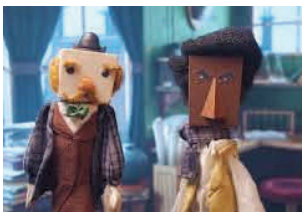

... **kay·fabe** [kā- fāb] 1) the tacit agreement between professional wrestlers and their fans to pretend that overtly staged wrestling events, stories, characters, etc., are genuine. **Broadly**: the tacit agreement to behave as if something is real, sincere, or genuine when it is not. 2) the playacting involved in maintaining kayfabe.

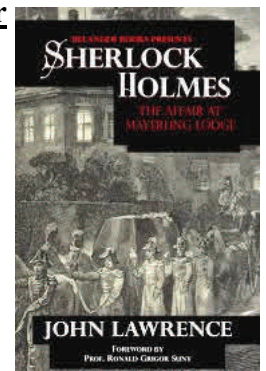

"Young Sherlock" ...Natascha McElhone plays Cordelia Holmes, described as 'Sherlock's devoted mother, artist and matriarch of the Holmes clan.'
